## 2018 SUMMARY REPORT

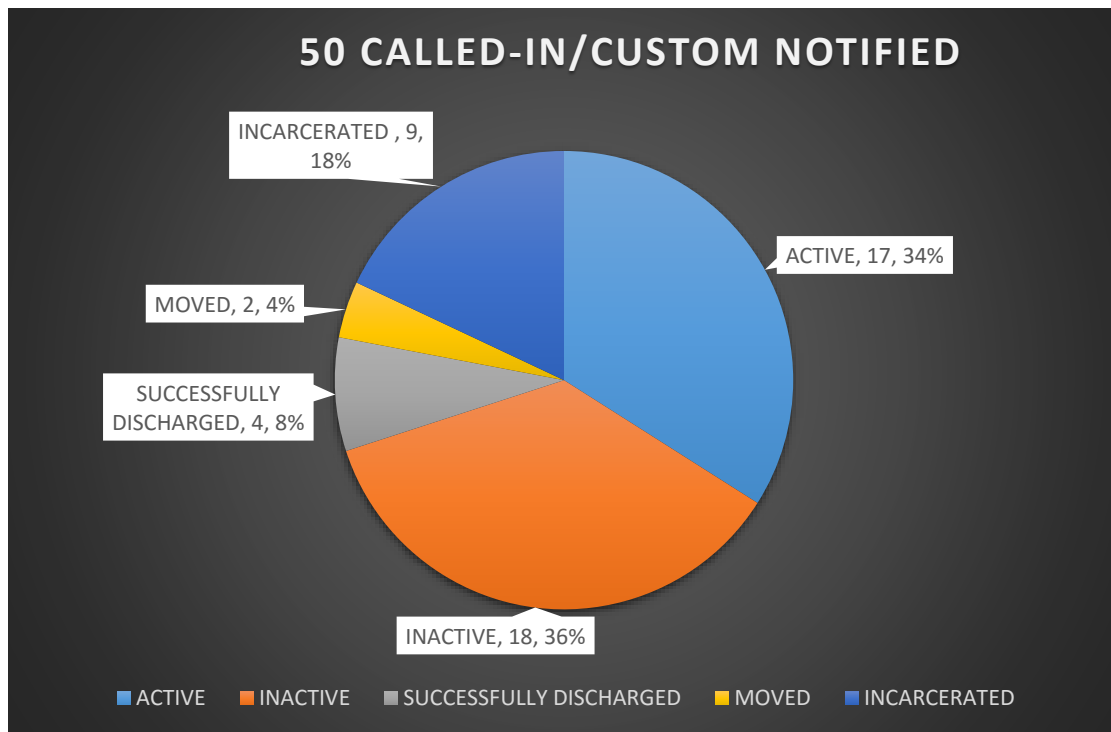
The following report summarizes the program participant outcomes for the 2018 calendar year.

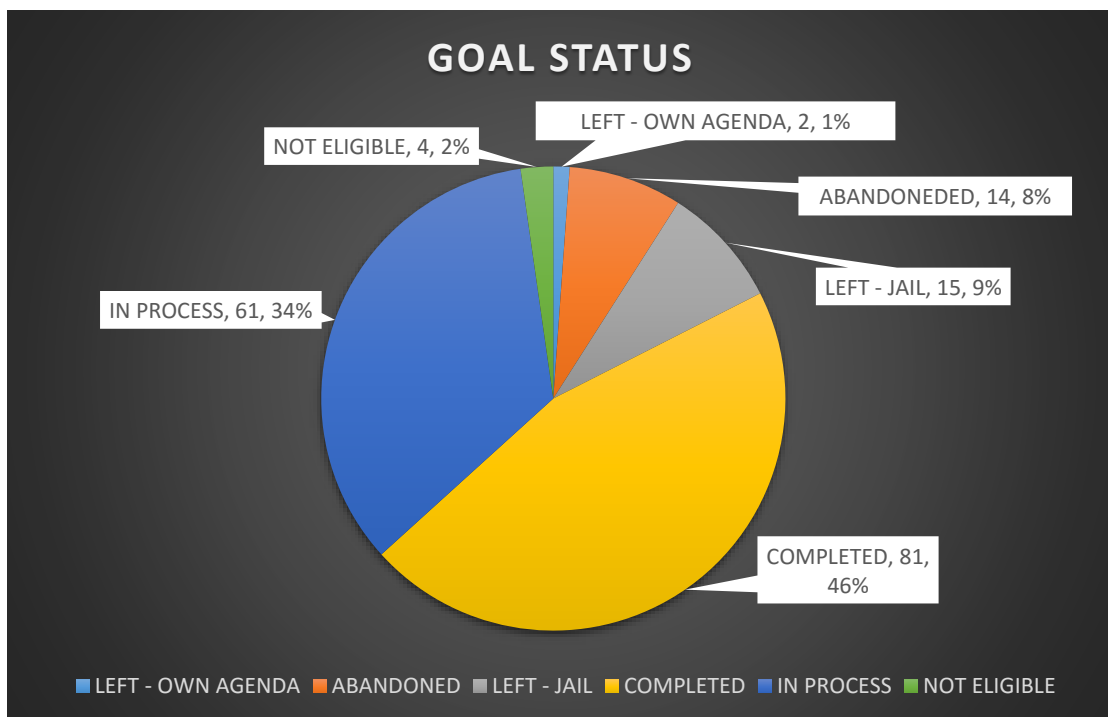
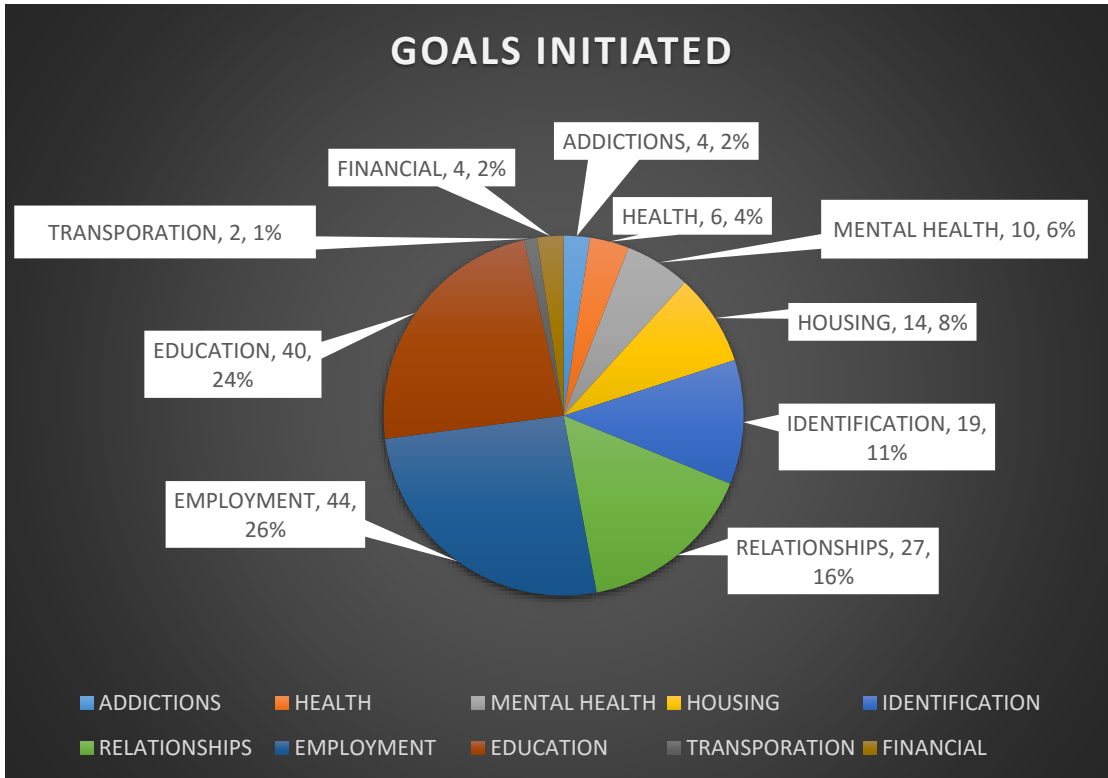

Between March 2018 and December 2018, 50 individuals were called-in to a notification meeting or were custom notified via home visit. Individuals were advised they were identified as having a high potential to re-offend or to become victims themselves. They were put on notice that enforcement for them was being handled differently – law enforcement partners were working in a coordinated fashion and any crimes committed would be dealt with in a swift and certain fashion. They were put on notice that the violence must stop.

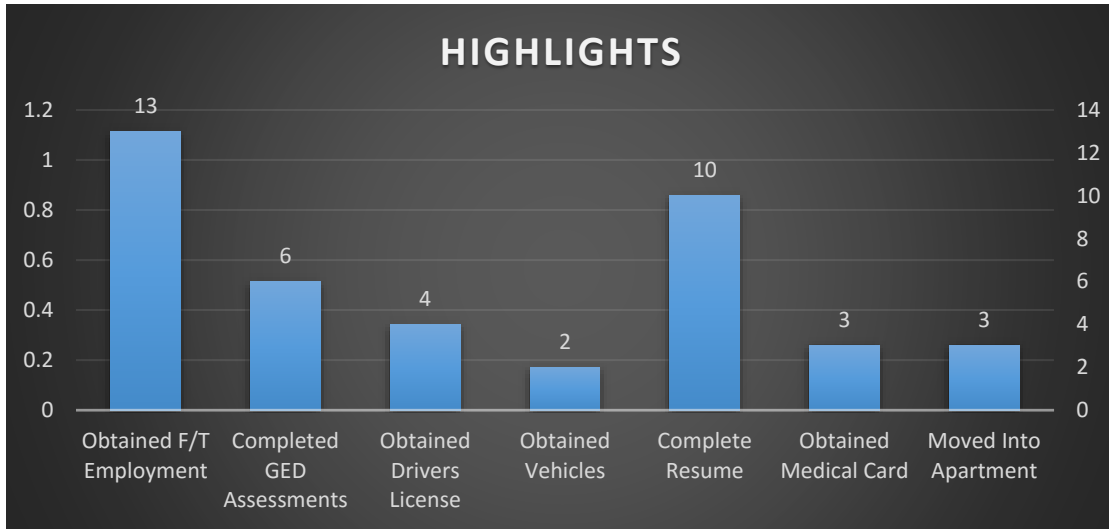
At the same time, they were offered a genuine offer of help. It was communicated there was an understanding that some may not have had opportunities in the past, and for those who chose the offer of help, a navigator was hired specifically to help them. This report is based on data taken from navigator/client sessions.



Based on individual needs assessments, participants set goals to begin rebuilding their lives. All work is in conjunction with probation and parole to not interfere with other orders. The navigator works with community providers to fulfil needs, and connects clients with community programs and services to achieve goals.



Support provided by the program helped participants engage in gainful activities. These are a few goal highlights, a sampling of the types of goals in which clients are requesting assistance.
