




Delinquency Petitions Filed in Winnebago County, SFY 1996-2019

Delinquency Petitions Filed and Adjudicated 1996 to 2019





Admissions to IDJJ from Winnebago County, by Type, SFY 1993-2019




--- New Sentence Admissions (Court) — Technical Violators — Total Admissions


Court Admissions to IDJJ from Winnebago County, by Offense Class, SFY 1993-2019




Percent of Court Admissions to IDJJ from Winnebago County, by Crime Class

Conclusions

- As a result of fewer delinquency cases & adjudications in Winnebago County, commitments to IDJJ have decreased 50% since 2010;
- An increasing share of commitments to IDJJ from Winnebago County are for violent offenses and more serious felony class offenses;
